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Course Description and Objectives

The main objective of this course is to introduce students to basic statistical concepts for summarizing, analyzing and presenting data. Main topics include regression, prediction, probability, estimation, and tests of significance.

This course is approved for the General Education in the Quantitative or Formal Reasoning requirement. Courses approved in this area have as their primary purpose the development of the analytical powers of the student as they might be exercises in the presentation and evaluation of mathematical or other formal symbolic systems.

Pre-requisites

MATH:0100, MATH:1005 or equivalent. Students should be comfortable with math at the level of elementary algebra (e.g., equation of a straight line, plotting points, percentages, powers and square roots).

Software and Calculator

Demonstrations in this course will be done with *Microsoft Excel*. A calculator is <u>not</u> required, but is recommended.

Grading System

This course will use the +/- grading system. Final course grades will be assigned as follows: A to A- = 100 - 90%; B+ to B- = 89 - 80%; C+ to C- = 79 - 70%; D+ to D- = 69 - 60%; F = below 60%

The instructor reserves the right to lower the cutoff points depending on the instructor's assessment of class and individual performance. The A+ grade is used only in extraordinary situations.

Homework: In general, <u>two</u> homework assignments will be assigned each week, and will be due on Tuesdays and Thursdays in the form of a Word document, PDF, or similar. You may also submit scans of clear hand-written solutions. No late submission will be allowed. The lowest homework score will be dropped to cover all extraordinary situations like medical emergencies, etc.

Exams: There will be two midterm exams and one final exam scheduled on the dates listed in the tentative course schedule below. All exams will be proctored virtually via Zoom, and you may be required to record your entire screen during the exam. Exams are open note and open book, meaning you can use your course materials during the exam. You may NOT collaborate with other students or individuals (including tutors, friends, AI, and online message boards such as Stack and Chegg) on exams. Failure to comply with this policy will result in a score of 0 on the exam.

Make-Ups: There will be NO make-up exams given except in extraordinary circumstances.

Grading: Questions about grading must be asked within two class days of the graded work's return.

Attendance: Attendance will be taken once a week on a random day. You will get <u>one free pass</u>.
