## **Course Description and Learning Outcomes**

This is the first of an essentially three-course sequence, with the other two being ACTS:4180 and ACTS:4280. These courses, together, would cover the long-term insurance part of the SOA exam, titled Fundamentals of Actuarial Mathematics (FAM), and the syllabus of the SOA exam, Advanced Long-Term Actuarial Mathematics (ALTAM).

This course covers only the above-mentioned part of the SOA Exam FAM, specifically the parts related to the theoretical basis of contingent payment models and their application to insurance and other financial risks. Students will learn the following:

- 1. The key features of insurance coverages and retirement financial security programs.
- 2. The key concepts concerning parametric and non-parametric mortality models for individual lives.
- 3. The calculations on the present value random variables associated with benefits and expenses for long-term insurance coverages.

4. The use of the premium calculation processes for long-term insurance coverages, and gain the ability to explain the process.

This course is approved by the SOA UEC program for part of the SOA exam Fundamentals of Actuarial Mathematics (FAM). This course, together with ACTS:4150 (Spring offering), covers the syllabus for this exam.

Prerequisites: STAT:3100 with a minimum grade of B- and ACTS:3080 with a minimum grade of C+.

Calculator: The following is adapted from the statement on the SOA website available here. Only the below-listed models of Texas Instruments calculators are approved for SOA exams, and hence for the quizzes, and exams for this class:

- BA-35
- BA II Plus
- BA II Plus Professional TI 30Xa or TI 30XA
- TI-30X II (IIS solar or IIB battery)
- TI-30XS MultiView (or XB battery)

Candidates may bring more than one calculator for the exam along with extra batteries, provided each calculator is on the approved list. Calculator covers and instructions will not be permitted in the exam. Please note that upon entering the exam room, candidates using the BA II Plus, BA II Plus Professional Edition, TI-30X IIS, TI-30XB (solar or battery), or TI-30XS MultiView (or XB battery) must demonstrate to the instructor that the memory has been cleared. The BA II Plus and BA II Plus Professional Edition will reset to their factory default settings when cleared. No other calculators may be available for those who fail to bring an approved model.

## **Evaluation**

#### **Class Attendance**

Attendance is not mandatory. It must be noted, however, that students who are frequently absent cannot expect the instructor to assist them in making up the missed material during office hours or via email.

### Assignments - 20%

The assignments will primarily be given on Fridays and are expected to be turned in by the following Saturday at midnight. Assignments must be scanned and uploaded to ICON to maintain a complete grading record, especially since this is a UEC course. Since I give an extra day on Saturday for submission, late assignments will **not** be accepted for any reason.

### **Biweekly Quizzes - 15%**

Seven quizzes will be given - typically on Mondays - on 9/8, 9/22, 10/6, 10/27, 11/10, 11/21 (**Friday**), and 12/8. The lowest score will be dropped for grading purposes. Hence, missed quizzes will not be made up for any reason.

#### Midterm Exam- 25%

This is a closed-book and closed-note 120-minute evening exam scheduled for 10/15/25 at 6:30-8:30 pm in W151 PBB. The exam will consist of SOA Exam-FAM-style questions, but will be set as a written answer exam instead of a multiple-choice one.

#### Final Exam - 40%

This is a closed-book, closed-note 2-hour exam consisting of SOA Exam-FAM-style questions but set as a written-answer exam instead of a multiple-choice one. It will be scheduled during the final exam week. The sample exam provided by the SOA, available here, is a good reference.

### **Missed Exams**

Missed exams can be made up only for university-approved reasons. Unless the reason for the absence prohibits providing advanced notice, the student must provide the instructor with the required documentation with sufficient advance notice. In the event of illness, the student should inform the instructor by the end of the exam day, unless the illness is so severe that it prevents such a notification.

### **Scoring for SOA UEC Credit**

To determine the granting of credit for the SOA Exam FAM under the SOA UEC program, the final will comprise 80% of the UEC score, and the assignments will comprise the remaining 20%. A minimum UEC score of 85% is required in each of ACTS:4130 and ACTS:4150 to obtain the credit. Note that your midterm exam contributes to your University of Iowa grade, but not to the UEC score.

### Grade Scale for U of Iowa Course Final Grade

The plus/minus grades will be used, and an A+ may be awarded to the top performer in the class who also makes significant contributions to in-class discussions. The exact scale will likely differ between undergraduate and graduate students, with the undergraduate scale resulting in an equal or higher letter grade for the same cumulative score.
